Wildlife Report 2019 by Doug Dempster

Lac Sir John enjoyed a great year for local wildlife and birds. The highlight for many this year was a loon population of up to four birds, more than the single pair normally seen. Loon calls were heard on most nights throughout the summer. We had two families of ducks that patrolled our waters. The great blue heron was often seen standing still on the shoreline or flying majestically at low altitude. There were many songbirds, woodpeckers, blue jays and of course hummingbirds. We saw turkey vultures circling high and saw a pair of hawks, likely broad-winged hawks, at tree-top level in the bay in August.

Deer made appearances, mostly at the North end of the lake. Beavers were sighted on the West and North shorelines. Racoons were present, and a good reason to secure the lid of your garbage can with a bungee cord.

Our fishermen continued to have good catches, and most beach areas had schools of small fish. It was a good year for frogs and toads.

Our wildlife appreciates the pristine environment and thrives when we limit noises that upset them. Let us know of any sightings that have impressed you.

The summer of 2019 was exceptional that we had no Sunday sailing cancelled due to weather. There were several Sundays with continuously strong winds that made for excellent races. The temperature was never cold or blustery, and racing was a pleasure in these conditions.

Water Quality Report 2019 By Doug Dempster

The lake water quality test results this year were excellent. The 12 samples around the lake were taken on 26 July following two weeks of hot, dry weather. Once again, we used the Bluewater Biosciences test plates that we incubated for 24 hours. Peter Nicholson and I read the results the following day.

The Canadian standard for safe swimming water requires less than 100 e-coli bacteria per 100 ml of water. This year eight of our test sites had zero e-coli and the other four had only 3, the lowest measurable amount of e-coli possible. This is the lowest level of e-coli that we have yet observed in the five years using this test procedure. The result correlates with the Vanier College testing done earlier in June.

We can conceive of two possible reasons for this exceptional annual result. First, the month of June was especially cold, and the lake may have been slower than normal to warm up. Second, we had very little rain in July and therefore run-off from properties and creeks was low, reducing inputs into the lake of fecal and organic matter from local fauna and flora.

At the meeting of Gore Lake Associations that Merv Trineer and I attended in June, there was special emphasis placed on inspecting and maintaining septic systems, especially as they age. Septic system malfunctions are a leading cause of reduced water quality in other Laurentian lakes. Gore has new procedures in this regard. There is no evidence of any septic tank run-off issues in this year's test results.

We should be proud of these results and confident of the safety of our water for swimming.

Another year and another successful corn boil at the boathouse beach. The event was even better attended than last year with as many as 41 people enjoying the food, games, bonfire and fireworks. I have heard though that this may have been the last year for fireworks at the corn boil as they tend to be expensive as well as having and negative environmental impact.

As you have no doubt noticed this year the corn boil was held in late July instead of the traditional early August. The reason for this is that in August the corn boil has often been postponed because of bad weather. By holding it in July the organizers hope to avoid postponements. Look forward to the 2020 corn boil to again be in late July.

A big thank you goes to Terry and Martha Brew for organizing the corn boil and to the numerous volunteers without whom this wonderful Lac-sir-John tradition could not continue.
